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Prepositions

A **preposition** connects nouns, pronouns, and phrases to other words in the sentence. It shows the relationship between a noun and another word in the sentence.

Prefixes

A **prefix** is added to the beginning of the root word. The prefix changes the meaning of the root word.

Example: re + do = redo

Re means to repeat or again. *Do* means to work on a task. *Redo* means to do the work again.
